Collection Information

Abstract : Buck Trolley Clothes Dryer Co. was a short-lived manufacturer of clothes dryers for three decker houses and other dwellings with limited space. It apparently operated less than a year in the late 1910s.

Historical/Biographical Notes

Buck Trolley Clothes Dryer Co. was located on Piedmont Street at the corner of Pleasant Street in the late 1910s. The company is not listed in city directories, and apparently lasted only a short time. It was one of numerous clothes dryer manufacturers providing clothes drying facilities intended primarily for three decker housing and other dwellings with limited space and featured a set of clothes lines on a sliding frame.

Scope and Content

The collection is comprised of a single broadside with illustrated advertisement for Buck Trolley Clothes Dryer, ca. 1915-1920.
