

ECLIPSES AND TRANSIT IN THE YEAR 1845.

There will be four Eclipses, this year, two of the Sun and two of the Moon, and a Transit of the Planet Mercury across the disc or face of the Sun.

- 1. Eclipse of the Sun on the 6th of May, in the morning, partly visible. At Boston the Sun will rise, 5, 17 digits eclipsed on the northern limb, at 4 h. 51 m. and the Eclipse will end at 5 h. 18 m.
- 2. Transit of the Planet Mercury across the Sun's southern Limb on Thursday the 8th of May, visible throughout America.
- 3. Eclipse of the Moon on the 21st of May, in the morning, invisible in America.
- 4. Eclipse of the Sun, on the 30th of October, in the evening, invisible in America.
- 5. Eclipse of the Moon on Thursday, November 13th, in the evening, visible. Beginning 6 h. 26 m. Middle, 8 h. 5 m. End, 9 h. 44 m. Duration of the Eclipse, 3 h. 18 m. Magnitude, 11,028 digits on the northern limb. The sight of this eclipse will be interesting if the evening prove favorable.



PUBLIC STREETS.

MR. HENRY J. HOWLAND,

Sir,—I am directed by the Selectmen of the Town of Worcester in compliance with your request to inform you of the names and locations of the several public streets in the Centre District of said Town. The other Streets, although open for public use, are private ways.

Bridge street leads from Front street northwesterly to Summer street.

Central street leads from Main street eastwardly to Pine street.

Church street leads from Park street northwardly to Mechanic street.

Franklin street leads from Park street eastwardly to Grafton street.

Front street leads from Main street eastwardly to Washington Square.

Grafton street leads from Washington Square southeastwardly towards Grafton.

Green's Lane leads from Lincoln street northeastwardly to house of Wm. E. Green, Esq.

Green street leads from Franklin street southwardly to Vernon street.

Grove street leads from Salisbury street northwardly towards West Boylston.

Highland street leads from Lincoln Square westwardly towards Paxton.

Jo Bill road leads from Salisbury street westwardly to its termination.

Lincoln street leads from Lincoln Square northwestwardly towards Shrewsbury.

Lincoln Square is located between the entrances of Highland, Lincoln, Main, Salisbury, Summer, and Turnpike streets.

Main street leads from Lincoln Square southwardly towards Leicester.

Mechanic street leads from Main street eastwardly to Bridge street.

Myrtle street leads from Main street eastwardly to Orange street.



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Washington Square. Grafton street leads from Washington Square south-

eastwardly towards Grafton.

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Lincoln street leads from Lincoln Square northwestwardly towards Shrewsbury.

Lincoln Square is located between the entrances of Highland, Lincoln, Main, Salisbury, Summer, and Turnpike streets.

Main street leads from Lincoln Square southwardly towards Leicester.

Mechanic street leads from Main street eastwardly to

Perry Place, from Mechanic st. to Rail Road Plymouth st. from Green to Washington st. Pond st. from Green to Winter st. Prospect st. from Summer st. east Rourke Place, between Temple and Winter sts. Short st. from Front to Mechanic st. Taft's Court, from Mechanic st. to Rail Road. Temple st. from Green st. to Canal Trumbull st. from Front to Park st. Vernant st. across the head of Culvert st. Vernon Place, from Vernon st. east Vine st. from Front to Cherry st. Walnut st. from 154 Main to Chestnut Warren st. from Front to Cherry Washington st. from Park st. southerly West st. from Elm to Pleasant st. William st. from Chestnut st. west Winter st. from Green st. to Canal

STATISTICAL AND HISTORICAL NOTICES.

There were in Worcester in 1718, if the evidence of the proprietary records is to be credited, fifty-eight dwelling houses. Tradition says they were humble edifices, principally of logs, one story high, with ample stone chimneys. Some were furnished with windows of diamond glass, where the resources of the proprietor afforded means for procuring such luxury; the light was admitted in many, through the dim transparency of oiled paper. Worcester, probably, contained at this period, about two hundred souls.

In 1722 the town was incorporated, and on the 28th of September of that year the inhabitants convened in their first town meeting, when Jonas Rice was chosen Town Clerk; Nathaniel Moore, Nathaniel Jones, Benjamin Flagg, Jonas Rice, and John Gray, Selectmen; Daniel Heywood, Treasurer.—Lincoln's History of Worcester.

In 1840, the No. of inhabitants was 7,497; and at the present time is believed to be not less than 10,000.

The number of Marriages from May 1, 1843 to April 30, 1844, was 89; the number of births, 263.

The number of deaths from May 1, 1843 to April 30, 1844 was 160. The ratio of deaths to population in 1830 was 1 in 61; in 1831, 1 in 61; in 1832, 1 in 65; in 1833, 1 in 70; in 1834, 1 in 80; in 1835, 1 in 63; and in 1843, 1 in 63.

The expenses the past year were from \$23 to \$30 per term for each student. The terms commence on the first Wednesdays in September and December, and the last Wednesdays of February and May.

AMERICAN ANTIQUARIAN SOCIETY.

This institution, having for its object the collection and preservation of materials for the history of the Western Continent, was founded by Isaiah Thomas, L. L. D and incorporated Oct. 12, 1812. The Society's Library containing upwards of 12,000 vols. and, doubtless, the most complete historical library in the country, is conveniently arranged in the Antiquarian Hall, situate on Lincoln Square. Its collections have been kept open to the public freely, and have been much frequented by strangers and scholars. Visitors are admitted daily from 11 to 12 A. M. Samuel F. Haven, is Librarian.

THE STATE LUNATIC HOSPITAL,

Established by the government of the state of Massachusetts, was opened for the reception of patients January 12th, 1833. It was originally designed for 120 patients, but has twice been enlarged, and will now accommodate more than 400 patients. It has connected with it a Chapel for religious worship, a commodious Hall for parties and evening prayers, Shops for mechanics, a Laundry in which all the washing, ironing and drying is to be accomplished under one roof, a Cookery for the supply of bread, pastry &c., and a Farm with all necessary appurtenances, to supply milk, vegetables &c. for the large family gathered in the Hospital.

Since the Hospital was opened it has admitted to this time, (Sept. 24, 1844,) one thousand nine hundred and seventy five patients; discharged one thousand seven hundred and eleven, of whom about nine hundred were recovered. There are now in the Hospital two hundred and sixty five patients, the new wings not yet being quite ready for the reception of patients;) the sexes are about equal. There is a good library accessible to all patients who desire to read, besides a large number of newspapers and periodicals which

are received daily, and admitted freely.

The Officers of the Hospital are—a Board of five Trustees, a Treasurer, Chaplain, Superintendent, Assistant Physician, Steward, Matron, and Clerk.

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
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
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
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
