



CITY LIBRARY.

In December, 1859, Dr. John Green presented his choice library of some 70:0 volumes, to the City of Worcester, on certain conditions, the principal of which were, that a suitable building should be erected for its safe keeping and use, and that the books should not be taken from the building except by himself. The library of the Lyceum and Library Association, consisting of between 4 and 5000 vols. was also donated to the city. The two libraries were accepted by the City Council, as the commencement of a free public library; a lot of land on Elm Street, near Main, purchased for \$5000; the sum of \$3000 appropriated for enlarging the library; and a Board of Directors elected, as follows:

John Green, for life.

D. S Messinger, John J. Power, for one year. Albert Tolman, W. A. Smith, for two years. A. H. Bullock, Sam'l D. Harding, for three years. Dwight Foster, W. W Rice, for four years. Henry Chapin, Geo. M. Rice, for five years. Stephen Salisbury, Isaac Davis, for six years.

In December of each year, two members are to be chosen for the six ensuing years.

This Board of Directors are to have the entire control and management of the Library, making such regulations as they see best, for the custody and loaning of the books, &c. &c.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The public schools in Worcester have long enjoyed a very high reputation for their excellence; and the larger part of them are well deserving that reputation. They are some forty in number, taught by 6 male and 66 female teachers, and located in all parts of the city, to accommodate, as nearly as may be, all the children within its boundaries. Those in the center and New Worcester are graded, and admission to their advantages is obtained by application to the Superintendent, at his office in City Hall. The schools are under the charge of a Committee of twenty-four, eight being elected each year, and serving three years, whose deliberations are presided over by the Mayor.

The Classical and English High School is designed to give free instruction in all the higher English studies, as well as in the Latin, Greek and French languages.

Besides the foregoing, a school is kept during the winter months, for the benefit of lads and young men who attend only during that time. For several years, also,

FREE EVENING SCHOOLS

have been opened during the winter, for persons of all ages, and both sexes, for whom no other school is provided. Domestics and other persons who are employed during the day, here have an excellent opportunity to commence or pursue their studies under competent teachers, free of cost; and many wisely avail themselves of it.

The evening school this winter, is in the Main street school house.

The commencement of the School year, and the arrangement of the terms and vacations, have been changed during the past year, and are as follows:

"The school year shall commence on the second Monday in May, and be divided into four terms, comprising forty-three weeks, and commencing respectively on the second Monday in May, the first Monday in September, the Monday after Thanksgiving, and the last Monday in February.

The Annual Examination shall be made at the close of the Spring term, and all promotions shall be made by the Visiting Committee at that time, and at no other, except in especial cases, to be voted by the Board.

The Vacations in all the schools, except the Suburban, shall be as follows: six weeks preceding the first Monday in September; Thanksgiving week; one week preceding the last Monday in February; and one week preceding the second Monday in May."

Therefore the Fall term will comprise eleven weeks; the Winter term twelve; the Spring, ten, and the Summer, ten.

Hon. A. H. Bullock having presented the city the sum of \$1000, as a fund from the income of which to present annually Medals for excellence in the High School, it has been decided to award twenty SILVER MEDALS to as many of the pupils, who shall excel in the several branches pursued in the School,—the award to be made by a Board of five Judges, to be elected annually by the School Committee, from citizens outside of their own number.
