Collection Information

Abstract : Collection contains contents of a box removed from the cornerstone of the Old South Church (First Congregational) on the corner of Main and Wellington Streets in Worcester. The box, which was placed in the cornerstone on July 4th, 1888, contains documentation about the church, religious newspapers and publications from the late 1880s, secular newspapers from the 1880s, publications about the Worcester Music Festival, photographs of the Church, and a Bible.

Historical/Biographical Notes

The “New” Old South Church was built on the corner of Main and Wellington streets in the late 1880s. It was built to replace the original Old South Church, which was purchased and

demolished by the City of Worcester in 1887 to make way for the new City Hall, which opened in 1898. Dedicated on September 17, 1889, the “New” Old South remained vibrant until the 1930s, when parishioners began moving away from downtown Worcester. Between 1939 and 1963, the congregation lost 392 members, while Tatnuck Congregational Church on Pleasant Street gained 212. In 1963 the two churches joined to form First Congregational Church, and that congregation continues to meet at the Church’s Tatnuck location. The New Old South was modified and is now elderly housing. When the cornerstone of the New Old South was laid on July 4th, 1888, a copper box with the items in this collection was placed inside. When the congregation moved to Tatnuck, the box went with them, and on the 250th anniversary of the founding of Old South Church, April 11, 1967, the box was opened. The box and its contents were put on permanent loan to the Worcester Historical Society on June 5, 1968.

Scope and Content

Collection contains information relating to the Old South Church, the “New” Old South Church, and the First Congregational Church of Worcester. The collection contains newspapers and other printed materials from the late 1880s and publications about the Worcester Music Festival. It also contains religious publications from the 1880s.
