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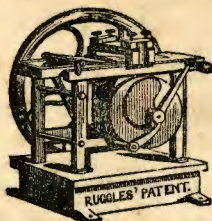



ECLIPSES IN 1847.

There will be two eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

1, The Moon will be partially eclipsed March 31, invisible here, but visible to nearly all the Eastern Continent.

2, The Sun will be totally eclipsed April 14 and 15; invisible here. The line of central eclipse will pass over the Indian Ocean, and the northern part of Australia.

3, The Moon will be partially eclipsed Sept. 24—invisible.

4, The Sun will be annularly eclipsed October 9—invisible here; but visible to the whole of Europe, nearly the whole of Asia, and the northern part of Africa.

ADVERTISEMENT.

It was designed to issue this fourth number of our little annual in a superior style to either of its predecessors; and so far as the matter is concerned, it will be found considerably improved; but we were sadly disappointed in the quality of the paper. A supply of beautiful white paper, sized so as to be written on with ink, was engaged, to be furnished in season, at two different mills in succession, but the great scarcity of water prevented the fulfillment of the engagement in both instances, and we were at a late day obliged to use such as we have used, or incur a delay of the publication far beyond the time when it ought to appear.

Those curious in such matters will observe that the Directory contains some 250 more names than that for 1846, while scarcely one half of the whole number remain without alteration. The Maps are printed from a new and steel plate, engraved for the present number by O. Pelton, and shows the locations of about twenty new streets. Market Street has been accepted by the town, and added to the list of public streets.

Confusion has been caused in some instances by the pertinacity of individuals who wish to change the names of some of the public streets, and have even gone so far as to put up in some places on the corners of the streets names of their own selection, instead of the correct names. It should be known to such persons, as well as to others, that the *names* of all our *public* streets are as legally established as the streets themselves, and can no more be changed by individuals than the locations of the streets.

The owners of private streets can of course change their names at pleasure; but the inconvenience caused by frequent changes will suggest, it is hoped, the desirableness of a careful selection of names at first, and as much permanence as is consistent with the interests of the proprietors.

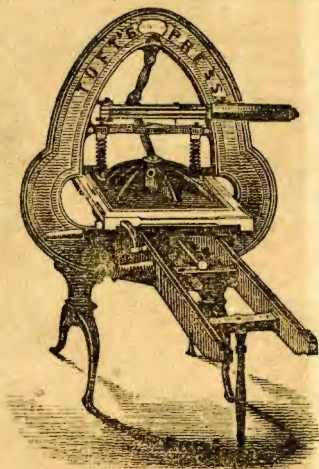

SCHOOLS.

The town of Worcester is divided into 14 School districts, in which thirty-two Schools are supported; besides the Classical and English High School, which is open to scholars of both sexes from all parts of the Town. Nineteen of these schools are in the Centre District, two in New Worcester, and one in each of the other Districts.

The CLASSICAL AND ENGLISH HIGH SCHOOL is under the charge and instruction of Mr. Elbridge Smith, as Principal, assisted by Miss Anna F. Brown in the Classical Department, and Mr. William E. Starr, and Miss Harriet Binney, in the English Department.

The studies in this school comprehend the Latin, Greek and French languages, the Mathematics, and the higher English branches usually taught in Academies and Female Seminaries. The course of study is so arranged, that those who intend to obtain a Classical Education may pursue uninterruptedly the studies necessary for admission to College; while those desirous of being fitted for practical life, or of receiving a thorough English Education, have equal opportunity for that purpose.

CENTRE SCHOOL DISTRICT.

A Board of Overseers consisting of twelve persons, is annually chosen by the inhabitants of the Centre District, to which the direction and supervision of the schools of the district are entrusted.

The Schools are of three classes, 1 Infant, 2 Primary, 3 Boys and Girls English Schools, from which scholars are promoted into the Classical and English High School.

For admission to these schools, application is to be made to the Secretary of the Board of Overseers, at his office or such other place as may be notified, between 8 and 9 o'clock Tuesday and Saturday mornings.

The Library is kept by Mrs. J. Wood, at her School Room, School Street, corner of Main Street, and is open every Saturday afternoon, from 1 to 6 o'clock.

THE WASHINGTON TEMPERANCE SOCIETY

Of Worcester was formed in May, 1841, and has for its objects 'the reclamation of the inebriate,—the prevention of intemperate habits,—and the promotion of total abstinence from all intoxicating liquors, among all classes of the community.' The present number of names on the roll of the Society is 3800, many of whom have been reclaimed through its influence, and rendered useful members of the community. Its meetings are held every Monday evening, in the Town Hall. The officers are elected three times a year, and serve four months.

PAKACHOAG DIVISION NO. 27 OF THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE.

A Society with this name was chartered by the Grand Division of the State of Massachusetts, February 23d, 1846, having for its objects "the Reformation of the inebriate," and affording mutual assistance in case of sickness. Its meetings are held on Tuesday Evening of each week.

WORCESTER AQUEDUCT COMPANY.

The Aqueduct built by this Corporation was completed Nov. 8, 1845, at an expense of about \$24,000.

The water is conveyed from Bell pond 107 rods to a Reservoir 150 feet by 50, and 10 feet deep; whence iron Pipes are laid through Prospect, Thomas, Main, Park, Salem, and a part of Mechanic, Pleasant, and Elm streets, with 58 Hydrants for drawing water for extinguishing fires. The head of the Reservoir at the outlet is 183 feet above the Aqueduct in Thomas Street, and 100 feet higher than the corner of Elm and Chestnut Streets. The pipes are 8, 6, 5 and 4 inches in diameter, proved to bear 500 pounds pressure, and

extend 767 1-2 rods in length. In two instances when the use of the Aqueduct was unfortunately needed for the extinguishment of fires, its utility was proved beyond a doubt. On Feb. 5, more property was undoubtedly saved by the prompt application of the water from three hydrants, and the consequent instant extinguishment of the flames, than the entire cost of the Aqueduct. *Managers*—Messrs.
