ECLIPSES IN 1848.

There will be six Eclipses, four of the Sun and two of the Moon, viz.

1. A small eclipse of the Sun's northern limb March 5, at half past 8 in the morning, visible in Massachusetts, but small.

2. An eclipse of the moon, March 19, at the time of the full moon. Visible in Worcester for 11 minutes after the moon rises.

3. An eclipse of the sun, April 3, just after sunset.

4. An eclipse of the Sun, August 28, visible only in the Southern ocean.

5. A total eclipse of the moon, September 12 and 13. Beginning at 13 minutes before midnight of the 12th; beginning of total darkness, at 36 minutes after 12 on the 13th. End of total darkness at 24 minutes after 2; and the end of the eclipse at 23 minutes after 3 in the morning.

6. An eclipse of the Sun, September 27, visible in Greenland.

TRANSIT.

Mercury will transit the Sun on the 9th of November, visible in the U.S. First contact of limbs, at 6 h. 17 m. in the morning. Least distance of centres, 9 h. Last contact of limbs, 11 h. 42 m. with reference to the centre of the earth.

COMET.

The great Comet of 1556 is expected this year, its period being reckoned at 292 years.



The number of ratable polls is 4,303, or 748 increase in

one year.

If the population has increased in an equal ratio with the the polls, the present population of Worcester must exceed 15,000.

The amount of Town and County Taxes in 1847, is \$42,

183, being at the rate of \$4,68 on a thousand dollars.

In addition to the above amount, the inhabitants of the Centre District raised \$7,828,82 for Schools, and \$1,981,75 on account of the Aqueduct, being an addition of \$1,33 on the thousand dollars. This is higher than usual, but was necessary to make extra improvements, and reduce the debt of the District.

Schools.

The town of Worcester is divided into 14 School districts, in which thirty-one Schools are supported; besides the Classical and English High School, which is open to scholars of both sexes from all parts of the Town. Eighteen of these schools are in the Centre District, two in New Worcester, and one in each of the other Districts.

The CLASSICAL AND ENGLISH HIGH SCHOOL is under the charge and instruction of Mr. Nelson Wheeler as Principal, assisted by Miss Caroline Henshaw, in the Classical Department, and Mr. William E. Starr, and Miss Harriet

Binney, in the English Department.

The studies in this school comprehend the Latin, Greek and French languages, the Mathematics, and the higher English branches usually taught in Academies and Female Seminaries. The course of study is so arranged, that those who intend to obtain a Classical Education may pursue uninterruptedly the studies necessary for admission to College; while those desirous of being fitted for practical life, or of receiving a thorough English Education, have equal opportunity for that purpose.

The Schools are of three classes, 1, Infant, 2, Primary, 3, Boys and Girls English Schools, from which scholars are promoted into the Classical and English High School.
